## Residents' Forum




### Martin Hughes, Chair, writes:

The Residents' Forum is a group of residents who meet every three months to look at Newlon's work and monitor performance.

#### At the last meeting:

- We held our annual planning meeting in May. This was a good opportunity for the Forum to reflect on the past year and plan what we want to achieve for the next. Our primary purpose is to work together with Newlon to improve services for all residents.
- As part of promoting the work of the Forum to all residents, we agreed to create
  a profile of our members with photos for the website so you can learn more
  about us, which will be coming soon.
- The Forum is looking for new members and are keen to recruit women living in Islington or Hackney, especially Asian or Turkish residents. Improvements to the information we give to new members were agreed so that they can feel part of our group from the moment they join.
- A name for the new resident panel was chosen the "Resident Think Tank". Thanks to Geraldine for coming up with the ideas we debated. The Resident Think Tank offers a variety of ways for residents to get involved and have a say about the services they get from Newlon so these can be improved. - Our agenda for 2018/19 was agreed and we chose some topics that will be debated at the Residents' Service Committee, a month after we discuss them. This will help ensure that our views are fed up to the Committee so that they can consider them when making their decisions.
- We are planning to visit some Newlon properties and estates to improve our knowledge of the variety of homes currently managed.

# Take the lead and form a Residents' Association

We encourage and support residents to set up a Residents' Association to act as a voice for their estate or area. These bring people together to ensure that we are providing the standard of service that we should be, and to make the most of their community through projects and social groups.

We have advice for getting started in the Residents' Association handbook on our website, which includes all information you need to know as well as a draft code of conduct and constitution.

Newlon may offer support to residents setting up a Residents' Association such as start-up funding, help towards running costs and training.

## GDPR, data protection and privacy

On 25th May new regulations around data protection known as the GDPR were introduced, which update the requirements of the Data Protection Act 1998.

The GDPR introduces a Europe-wide agreed standard and in most instances reinforces or maintains the standards of the Data Protection Act.

Newlon holds a significant amount of residents' data in order to be able to create and manage tenancies. We are committed to managing this data securely and in line with the requirements of the GDPR.

The privacy notice provides information about how we use and store data and details our nominated Data Protection Officer. It also outlines your rights in relation to the data we hold.

## Residents' portal reaches soft launch

We are making good progress in the development of a new online portal which will provide residents with a secure online space to carry out a wide range of services including making payments, checking rent statements, updating contact details and reporting communal repairs.

We are now rolling out a soft launch to a working group of residents so we can test its functionality and usability.

Once this is complete a full roll-out will take place later this year.

## How we can help: a case study

Myriam in one of the many residents our Community Services team has helped into employment. Here she explains more:

I found out about Newlon's employment programme through Newlon News and signed up to it on an open day. I had a lengthy chat which I found very helpful

Getting on to the programme was pretty easy. However, I do live quite far and transport isn't easy so being able to have regular contact with the team via telephone and email made it a lot easier.

I started a course recommended by my advisor, Paula, which really built my confidence. I made new friends and contacts and developed my skills for the work environment.

Paula was always there to help, she was very understanding and made sure I could understand what was going on. She always made time for me and always called back when she missed my calls.

I recommend to other people looking to get into employment that you get as much as much experience as possible within a work environment, learn and build your CV and do different courses

If you have taken time off work due to children or illness, it takes a lot of time to get back into a work routine. Programmes like these really help.

# The story of Norton Folgate Community Group

Back in mid-2016 a group of residents living in Spitalfields discussed creating a residents' association with the aim of representing the tenants living in three neighbouring Newlon blocks. Here the founders tell their story:

NORTON FOLGATE
Residents Association

There was already a strong sense of community with those of us who had lived in this busy area of East London for many years, so we wanted to give the Newlon tenants a collective voice and ultimately improve their day to day lives in a tangible way.

With the help of Newlon we surveyed all 50 tenants and then looked into creating a formal residents' association. The decision to create a formal group was a little daunting but would ultimately allow us to access various grants and be registered with bodies including Tower Hamlets Planning Committees. The whole process including opening a bank account took a good six months but the result has been really worthwhile.

Our residents' group meets every three months or so and over the past 18 months our projects have included organising regular bulk rubbish removals for all the tenants, Christmas tree recycling, numerous ASB initiatives with Tower Hamlets Council and the Metropolitan Police, as well as successful joint project with Newlon to install bicycle racks. A current major project is

organising window cleaning of all tenants' properties, scheduled for completion this Summer.

It certainly hasn't been easy, but the benefits of having a residents' association that can act on behalf of tenants has opened many doors and given us a real voice in the local area.

If you want to do something similar to us then Newlon can help with all the formalities in creating an association and, if you can rely on a solid core group to participate regularly, then it can definitely help with building a strong local community. When setting one up our advice is take it at your own pace, have flexible timescales, try to include as many people's views as possible and make firm decisions. Good luck!

# The secret history of our streets



#### The Crescent, Enfield

We provide nearly 8,000 homes, ranging from new build high-rise developments to 18th century street properties. Many have fascinating histories. Here we continue our regular feature exploring some of them.


The Crescent in Hertford Road Edmonton, Enfield, is a striking Grade II listed terrace of 25 homes built between 1826 and 1851. It forms the centre of a conservation area and was originally built for property speculation by a London solicitor, whose name has not been recorded. At the time of construction it would have been far more urban in character than the surrounding area.

The name Edmonton comes from the Anglo-Saxon name, Adelmetone and continuous settlement of the area dates back to this period. During the 18th century, the area was developed as a prosperous suburb providing clean air and space within easy reach of the city.

By the early 1800s terraced housing was starting to replace single houses particularly along Fore Street and Edmonton Green. Since the 1870s Enfield has developed from a modest market town surrounded by open countryside and small villages to a pattern of suburbs on the edge of London.


This transformation was triggered by the advent of the railways and took place in a piecemeal manner, with former villages being developed into local shopping centres and industries being developed along the Lea Valley.

Originally The Crescent faced an enclosed, communal front garden, with a carriageway serving the houses, entered past lodges at the north and south ends of the site. Sometime before 1934 the communal garden was replaced with long front gardens running from each house to the road.



To the rear of there was a short row of cottages accessed from the lane at the bottom of The Crescent's rear gardens. By 1934 these cottages had been re-built and re-named as Oxford Close. The Crescent was listed by Historic England in 1954.

During 2014 and 2015 Newlon and Enfield Council worked together on a programme of renovation works and this project has culminated in the creation of the Monmouth Road Green. This has seen the landscaping of an informal grassed space on the corner of Hertford Road and Monmouth Road so that it now enhances the setting of The Crescent, providing a calm place for residents focussed upon a crescent of pleached trees, feature paving and planting for year-round colour.
